- 3) Two of these animals migrate to warmer places in winter, returning to the Peak District in the summer to breed. Do you know which ones?

Another one goes off to the seaside for winter, but comes back to the hills to breed in summer. Which one do you think it is?

One leaves the UK in spring to breed in Scandinavia. Which is it?
